Three red marbles-W. E. Petersen

One day Mr. Miller was bagging some early potatoes for me. I noticed a small boy, delicate of bone and feature, ragged but clean, hungrily apprising a basket of freshly picked green peas.

I paid for my potatoes but was drawn to the display of fresh green peas. Pondering the peas, I couldn't help overhearing the conversation between Mr. Miller and the ragged boy next to me.

"Hello Barry, how are you today?" "H'lo, Mr. Miller. Fine, thank ya. Jus' admirin' them peas, sure look good." "They are good, Barry. How's your Ma?" "Fine. Gittin' stronger alla' time." "Would you like to take some peas home?" "No, Sir. Got nuthin' to pay for 'em with." "Well, what have you to trade me for some of those peas?" "All I got's my prize marble here." "Is that right? Let me see it." "Here 'tis. She's a dandy." "I can see that. Hmmmmm, only thing is this one is blue and I sort of go for red. Do you have a red one like this at home?" "Not zackley, but almost." "Tell you what, take this sack of peas home with you and next trip this way let me look at that red marble." "Sure will. Thanks Mr. Miller."

Mrs. Miller, who had been standing nearby, came over to help me. With a smile she said, "There are two other boys like him in our community, all three are in very poor circumstances. Jim just loves to bargain with them for peas, apples, tomatoes, or whatever. When they come back with their red marbles, and they always do, he decides he doesn't like red after all and he sends them home with a bag of produce for a green marble or an orange one, perhaps."

I left the stand smiling to myself, impressed with this man. A short time later, I moved to Colorado but I never forgot the story of this man, the boys, and their bartering. Just recently I had occasion to visit some old friends in that Idaho community and while I was there learned that Mr. Miller had died. They were having his viewing that evening, and knowing my friends wanted to go, I agreed to accompany them. Upon arrival at the mortuary, we fell into line to meet the relatives of the deceased and to offer whatever words of comfort we could. Ahead of us in line were three young men. One was in an army uniform and the other two wore nice haircuts, dark suits and white shirts...all very professional looking.

They approached Mrs. Miller, standing composed and smiling by her husband's casket. Each of the young men hugged her, kissed her on the cheek, spoke briefly with her and moved on to the casket. Her misty light blue eyes followed them as each young man stopped briefly and placed his own warm hand over the cold pale hand in the casket. Our turn came to meet Mrs. Miller. I told her who I was and mentioned the story she had told me about the marbles.

With her eyes glistening, she took my hand and led me to the casket. "Those three young men who just left were the boys I told you about. They just told me how they appreciated the things Jim 'traded' them. Now, at last, when Jim could not change his mind about color or size...they came to pay their debt."

"We've never had a great deal of the wealth of this world," she confided, "but right now, Jim would consider himself the richest man in Idaho." With loving gentleness, she lifted the lifeless fingers of her deceased husband. Resting underneath were three exquisitely shined red marbles.

The training will be held at Duarte Show Cattle Ranch, (3789 Suncrest Ave., San Jose, CA 95132); on Saturday, February 23, 2019, 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., and Sunday, February 24, 2019, 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. The cost is \$35 per person. It will include a PowerPoint, lecture, review of equipment, practice shooting and teaching, and a written test. - ► MARKET STEER entries & photos must be received in the Fair Office no later than 5:00 pm Jan. 23, 2019; e-mailed photos by 5:00 pm Jan. 22, or entries will be disqualified. If you email photo(s), confirmation will be sent that photo(s) were accepted. If you do not receive confirmation, contact the Fair Office prior to deadline.
- ► MARKET GOAT, HOG & LAMB entries are open at this time. Entries will close 5:00 p.m. March 25. A Market Hog lottery was held on Wednesday, Jan 9. There is currently a waiting list for Market Hogs. Please contact the Fair Office if you have a member that is no longer participating in the swine project so we can roll up the waiting list.
- ► MARKET ANIMAL PHOTO REQUIREMENTS- Photo of exhibitors with market goat, hog or lamb are due by March 25. If photos are not submitted by March 25, entries will be disqualified. Emailed photos must be received by 12:00 noon, Fri. March 22, 2019. If you email photo(s), confirmation will be sent that photo(s) were accepted. If you do not receive confirmation, contact the Fair Office prior to deadline.
- ▶ If you purchase a market animal outside of the State of California, be aware of State Rules regarding health inspections & entry permits. See State Rules (www.cdfa.ca.gov/fe) or call the Fair Office if you have questions.
- ▶ Market Hog Exhibitors must submit name of breeder, city & state where hog was purchased by March 25.
- ▶ Market Lambs & Goats must submit Bill of Sale & Scrapie information by March 25.
- ► Independent Market Lambs, Hogs & Goats must submit photo, bill of sale and proof of ownership form by 5pm Mar 25
- ▶ YQCA Certification Requirement: All Jr. Livestock Exhibitors are required to participate in a Quality Assurance & Ethics Awareness Training or complete the online YQCA (Youth for Quality Care of Animals) course & provide current certification of completion no later than 5 pm, April 15, 2019 or your entry will be disqualified. YQCA.org
- ▶ RABBIT MEAT PEN entries will be accepted beginning 8:00 a.m. Friday, Feb. 1. If at 12:00 noon on the 5th business day after entry opening there are more than 40 meat pens (limit) the Fair will institute a lottery to draw for the 40 spots. After the first 40 have been drawn, we will draw for waitlist order. See website for complete lottery rule. Weight limit: 3 rabbits/pen, each weighing between 3 ½ lbs. 5 ½ lbs., & not more than 10 weeks of age.
- ► <u>APRIL 15 ENTRY CLOSING for most other departments still entries, breeding livestock, etc.</u> See Exhibitor Handbook for all closing dates, dates entries are received, instructions, & class information.
- ▶ 2019 EXHIBITOR HANDBOOK will be available on our website February 15. No hard copy will be mailed.
